# Local chain saw artist Tom Brosseau

ive years ago Tom Brosseau went to Hackensack, Minn., to a show of chain saw art and found his inspiration to begin doing his own chain saw carving. An art form he enjoys, in his words, "to an obsession." In 1979 Tom lived in Alaska where he spent his days hunting and trapping. During the long dark days he began wood carving to pass the time. This was also an art at which he became proficient, although he said it was slow as he worked with a carving knife to create his figures. When he was introduced to chain saw carving, he already had developed some of the artistic skills needed for him to carve realistic animals and was inspired to begin his own studio in which to work.

Today he lives west of Thief River Falls with his wife, Kim. They are parents

The first pieces he showed us were carvings of eagle feathers that were a perfect replica of real feathers. The intricate work made me wonder if it was real or a carving. In one word it was beautiful.

In the barn, which he uses as a workshop, there were bear, eagles, hawks, a mountain man, Oscar the Grouch, a mountain goat, gnomes, a wolf and a deer. These were in varying stages of completion. The gnomes were painted to resemble the folk lore figures. To challenge himself and his artistic expertise, he made a female figure out of white pine. It was sanded and ready to finish. It is a piece that someone might want to use on the prow of a boat as a masthead.

Smaller items he frequently makes are morel mushrooms in varying sizes. He also has made fish, frogs and a large totem pole. On the base of each pedestal

#### GUEST EDITORIAL

### Final EPA carbon rules to impact co-op members

hen the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) issued its Clean Power Plan Aug. 3, Minnkota Power Cooperative, Red Lake Electric Cooperative's wholesale power provider, was understandably stunned. That's because the rule looked nothing like what had been proposed just a year earlier.

It was much, much worse for electric consumers in the region.

First, it is important to note that Minnkota is most concerned with the way the Clean Power Plan is applied to North Dakota because that is where all of our electric generation assets are located. In 2014, the EPA told North Dakota that it would require an 11 percent cut in carbon dioxide emissions by 2030 to meet the overall national goal. The EPA went to great lengths to explain how it studied each state's unique circumstances and resources.

But only a year later, the EPA issued a final rule that requires a 45 percent reduction - more than quadrupling the original proposal.

No notice. No discussion. No logical explanation.

State officials in North Dakota now are in the unenviable position of developing a plan to meet one of the most stringent carbon standards in the nation. And they don't have long (5728004.04, Albert Bjorgo) to determine the best path forward: The initial state plan needs to be submitted to the EPA by September 2016, and base-level compliance begins in 2022.

So, there is one year to determine how to radically reshape North Dakota's energy industry and then five years to have it partially implemented. Tough, irrevocable and potentially expensive decisions will need to be made to comply.

An initial analysis of the 1,560-page rule indicates that there is no way North Dakota can get to 45 percent without either shutting down some of the state's coal plants or operating them at drastically reduced levels.

That's a big problem.

Power plants fueled by lignite coal are

the backbone of the region's electric grid. They run reliably around the clock, and they do so cost-effectively.

North Dakota's utilities have a proven record of developing and implementing technologies that significantly reduce emissions. More than \$2 billion in stateof-the-art technology has been installed in recent years to keep our air clean. The result has made North Dakota one of only seven states to meet all of the EPA's strict federal ambient air quality standards.

Prematurely shutting down plants would strand these substantial investments, meaning consumers will have to pay for the expenses associated with that plant while paying the additional costs for new power plant assets.

As an industry, we can find new, innovative technology to make strides toward reducing carbon emissions. It just takes time. Unfortunately, the EPA's plan gives us no time and ties up all investment dollars in building new power plants fueled by a different source.

That's a shame, because North Dakota still has 800 years of recoverable coal reserves available.

Our concern with the rule doesn't stop at coal. Minnkota's current investment in wind energy in North Dakota does not count (5014001.02, Andy D. Peterson) toward the EPA's standard simply because it was installed before 2013.

Nearly 30 percent of our electric generation capacity comes from wind – one of the top percentages among electric cooperatives in the nation. Another 10 percent comes from emissions-free hydropower.

No credit is given by the EPA for our membership's prudent yet significant investments in these resources.

What does this mean for electric rates in the region? It means costs likely will go up significantly for homes, schools, businesses and farms. Just how much remains

If our economy is going to thrive, we will need access to reliable, low-cost electricity. The Clean Power Plan, as it stands today, puts that resource in jeopardy.



### **Line Service** Department

here does the time go? Seems like only a month ago we were waiting for the frost to get out of the ground so we could start to plow in cable. As much as I hate to say it, in several weeks we could be dealing with frozen ground again. The line department has been busy with many new services, service upgrades and improvements to our system this construction season. We will be able to set poles throughout the winter, but underground construction typically comes to a halt the first part of November.

I would like to send out my appreciation and thanks to the landowners I've worked with this year. They have been very accommodating to allow Red Lake Electric to build electric line across their land. This considerate act was to either provide service to a neighboring property or to reroute/rebuild the line to improve RLEC's distribution system. Thank you!

In September, Ram Utilities fin-

ished pole inspections for the year. They inspected and tested about 3,000 poles on our system out of the Terrebonne substation. Ram Utilities rejected approximately 100 poles. The linemen have started to change out poles and will continue throughout the winter. The most common reasons for a pole to be rejected are: 1) external or internal rot; 2) damage caused by machinery; and 3) damage by animals, insects and lightning. Our goal is to inspect our entire system of 40,000 poles on a 10- to 15-year rotation.

In closing, if you have added or plan to add bin fans, grain dryers, electric heat, or any other large electric load, please contact us. We want to make sure your account is properly sized (4515009.02, Jeffrey W. Martinson) to avoid overloading your existing service and damaging our equipment. As always, stay safe and if you have any questions or concerns, please contact us.

#### **Sour Cream Apple Squares**

9x13 pan - 375 degree oven 2 cups flour 2 cups brown sugar ½ cup butter, softened 1 cup chopped nuts (optional) 1½ tsp. cinnamon 1 tsp. soda ½ tsp. salt 1 cup sour cream 1 tsp. vanilla 1 egg 2 cups apple, peeled and chopped

Cut butter into flour and sugar until crumbly. Add nuts and mix. Press twothirds of this mixture into 9x13 ungreased pan. To the remaining mixture, add cinnamon, soda, salt, sour cream, vanilla and egg and mix. Add apples and mix well. Spoon apple mixture over crust mixture in pan. Bake at 375 degrees for 25-35 minutes. Cool. May serve with whipped cream. - Submitted by Bev Schmitz

#### Things you should know about your electric service



#### **BILLINGS AND COLLECTION**

You will receive your energy bill on or near the 10th of each month. Payment of your monthly energy bill is due on the 10th of the month. You may pay your bill in person at RLEC during office hours, use the 24-hour drive-up drop box located next to the RLEC office, by Auto Pay, by mail or by Bill4U on www.redlakeelectric.com. Payment must be in our office or in the mail as evidenced by the postmark on or by the 25th day of the month to avoid a late payment charge. A 11/2% monthly late payment charge will be computed on delinquent energy bills, the minimum late payment charge will be \$1.00.

If your payment is not received by the end of the month, a notice of disconnection statement will be included in the message area on your following energy bill. The disconnection statement will give a final notice of when your electric service will be disconnected if the delinquent amount remains unpaid. If an employee is sent to disconnect your electric service, an \$80 collection fee will be charged to your account, even if you pay the collector.

To have a disconnected service reconnected, all amounts owing, including the \$80 reconnection fee and a security deposit must be paid. If the service must be reconnected after normal working hours, a \$250 reconnection fee must be paid.

A \$25 charge will be levied each time a check is returned because of nonsufficient funds, account being closed or payment stopped along with any applicable bank charges. Any bank charges to the Cooperative shall be added to the NSF charge.

#### **OUTAGES**

If your electricity goes out, please do the following: 1. Check your fuses or breakers at the yard pole or meter

- 2. Call your neighbor to see if they are out of electricity also. 3. Call the RLEC office (218-253-2168 or 1-800-245-6068)
  - during working hours or 218-253-2200 after hours.

#### **METER TESTS**

RLEC has a schedule in place to have its meters periodically tested for accuracy. Results from these tests show that meters generally slow down with age; however, if you think that your meter is recording too much usage, RLEC will test it for accuracy. You must pay a test fee of \$80 in advance of the test. If the meter test shows that the meter was inaccurate, the test fee will be refunded to you.

#### STOPPED METERS

If you find your meter has stopped and you are using electricity, please contact the office immediately so we can replace it. Average consumption will be billed to the member for the time the meter was stopped so there is no advantage in not reporting a stopped meter.

#### METER READINGS

An automated meter reading system is utilized to obtain monthly meter readings. Although the system is normally reliable, there is always a chance that the correct reading has not been transmitted to the office for billing. Customers should periodically read their meter and compare it to the reading on the billing statement. If the actual reading is not close to the billing statement reading, please call the office. Please keep in mind that the reading on your bill is from the end of the month.

he decorative lights, fog machines, black lights and animatronics of Halloween make for adventurous, entertaining times for children and adults. With these decorations, though, the risk of fire or electrocution could be lurking around the corner. It is important to check for electrical hazards before accidents happen. Use the following tips to keep electrical hazards from haunting you this Halloween:


- inspect electrical decorations. Look for cracked or frayed sockets, loose or bare wires and loose connections.
- Read manufacturer's instructions regarding installation and maintenance. Check the instructions to see how many light strings can be connected together.
- Always unplug light strings before replacing any bulbs.
- Fasten outdoor lights securely to trees, walls or other firm supports. Do not use nails or tacks that could puncture light strings or electrical/extension cords.
- Provide well-lit walkways and porch lighting for trick-or-treaters. Make sure the walkways are clear for trick-or-treaters.
- Don't overload extension cords or place them near, or in, snow or water.
- Make sure electrical decorations are approved by a nationally recognized certification organization like "UL" (Underwriters Laboratory) and marked for outdoor use if you are using them outside. Check www.cpsc.gov or www.ul.com for recalls. Many Halloween toys have been recalled in the past by the Consumer Product Safety Commission.
- Do not overload your circuit breakers or fuses.
- Plug lights and decorations into circuits protected by ground fault circuit interrupters (GFCIs). Portable outdoor GFCIs can be purchased where electrical supplies are
- Make sure decorative lighting is well-ventilated, protected from weather and a safe distance from anything flammable like dry leaves and shrubs. Do not coil power cords or extension cords while in use or tuck under rugs or drapes.
- Turn out all lights and decorations before leaving or going to bed. Always have at least one fire extinguisher available and know how to use it.

he "brands" his trademark. To help keep the images in good shape, he makes a relief cut on the back side of the piece. This allows for the expansion and contracting of the wood. After he finishes the carving, he uses a hand grinder (3606001.04, Kathryn I. Nelson) to smooth the wood and prepare it for the finish.

When finished, he uses Australian Timber Oil to coat each piece and this adds color. If there are areas where more color is desired, he chars the wood with a torch. Often a coat of polyester varnish is given to the carvings and this should be renewed each year.

On his deck he has a Tombstone Chair that he also made. It is unique and again the original style is from chairs that were built in pioneer days.

The logs he uses come from varying sites. His favorites include white pine logs he gets locally and some near Puposky, Minn. He finds oak and cottonwood not as easy to work with as pine. Often trees from yards will have hardware embedded in them so he is wary of cutting into them with his saws.


